B4RN4Burton

B4RN4Burton has now successfully connected 220 properties, accounting for around 34% of the local population. While this is a significant milestone, the B4RN team is still hard at work, ensuring more residents can access the reliable, full-fibre internet connection that has become essential in modern life. The effort is paying off as the community continues to embrace the benefits of broadband access.

The Burton Morewood CE Primary Academy and Nursery has recently installed a new Internet Telephony switchboard system, funded by a donation from the B4RN4Burton Community Dig Team, who raised the money through garden digs and house kit fitting as part of their B4RN project

One of the most visible impacts of B4RN's work has been felt in the village's community assets, with the village hall, the parish church and the local primary school all receive a free B4RN Service. Their most recent challenge was connecting Burton's Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA) – a local sports facility with an all-weather pitch and tennis courts – their security can now benefit from the network and again a free connection.

Burton Singers - 'Songs for Winter Night'

Burton Singers enjoyed a sold out 'Songs for a Winter's Night' concert before Christmas. An evening full of singing, including the audience with some Christmas classics and carols, laughs with Mick Fishwick as compere and songs beautifully conducted by Val and superbly accompanied by Stuart. A big thankyou to everyone who attended.

A total of £1,200 was raised on the night and will be allocated between two local charities. The first is: 'With Singing in Mind'- this Kendal based charity provides group singing sessions for people and their carers who have neurological conditions. The second is The Rosemere Cancer Foundation who work in South Cumbria and Lancashire to support local cancer patients. The next concert will be Saturday 14 th June.

News from Burton Memorial Hall

I can hardly believe that it's February and we're almost at the start of Spring already, it only seems a week or so since Christmas and here we are looking forward to our next two events at the hall.

Firstly we have our mid-monthly coffee morning on Saturday 15th February, from 10am until 11.30am, with a host of delicious home-made cakes on offer, plus we'll have Kingsharp back in the car park from 10am until 12 noon to sharpen your blunt things - household, DIY or garden tools can all be dealt with, so why not pop along and see them.

Secondly, on Saturday 22nd February we will welcome back to the hall two superb musicians: Tim Chu and Ian Bailey, with their Celebration of Simon and Garfunkel show, all those songs you know and love, plus anecdotes and funny stories about S&G themselves. It's a bring your own drinks night, and tickets are on sale at the Village Store now at £15 per person.

Looking further ahead in the year, you'll probably be aware that 2025 is the 80th anniversary of the end of the Second World War, and as we are a Memorial Hall whose origins lie in the dark days of the early 1940s, we want to commemorate that event. Our idea is to create a display of memories and family stories from residents about war time experiences, not just about people who were in the village during WW2, but for those who live here now to also share their families' involvement in it: whether as a child evacuee, or your relatives' involvement in the armed forces, or the land army, or as a munitions worker, or in a reserved occupation such as a miner or a glassworker, or as an ARP warden, or working as a code breaker, or for the Special Operations Executive, we'd love to hear your stories and, if possible, share your photos or records from those family members (we can scan photos and documents so as to protect and preserve your precious originals as well). We'll use them to create a display in the hall which will be in place from VE Day (8th May) through VJ Day (15th Aug) until the 2nd September 2025 (the 80th anniversary of the formal signing of the final instrument of surrender). We are also hoping to host more activities and events as part of this commemoration, and I'll include news of these in the next few

Burton Pickleball Club

Burton Pickleball is about to celebrate its second-year anniversary. For those who are wondering 'What on earth is Pickleball '! Here is a little backstory...

Pickleball was introduced to our Village by Jane Portnel, GoPickle. Jane is a great ambassador of the sport and has introduced pickleball to numerous villages by holding a set of fundamental sessions and supporting potential new clubs with the loan of equipment until groups become established.

A HUGE thank you also goes to Burton Tennis Club, who have taken Burton Pickleball under their wing and helped with the numerous forms to obtain a small grant which was used to buy our own equipment.

Pickleball, invented in 1965 as a garden game and named after the family dog Pickles (although there are other stories regarding the origins of the sport's name), has taken the UK by storm in recent years, being welcomed into tennis clubs, leisure centres, and village halls across the country and stealing the nation's hearts.

The sport is played on a badminton-sized court, with a tennis-style net, and players use paddles similar to paddles seen in table tennis. The dimensions of the court and net, contribute to the unique feel of pickleball in comparison with other sports played with rackets.

Much of Pickleball's growing popularity is down to its inclusivity for players of all ages and abilities.

In recent years, celebrities such as Kim Kardashian, actor Leonardo DiCaprio and the late Friends star Matthew Perry, plus tennis legend Serena Williams, have revealed they enjoy the game.

While pickleball can be a sport that is taken seriously, most of us are on the courts for camaraderie, exercise, and laughter.

Many of our players have recently moved into the village and have stories of how pickleball has helped them make new friends and build meaningful connections. These stories highlight the unique power of pickleball to bring people together, regardless of background, age, or skill level.

It's A Date In Burton: by Kath Hayhurst

Here are two extracts from The Lancaster Gazette:

"Died 19th May 1827 at Burton in Kendal Deborah Wilcock many years landlady of the Cross Keys Inn."

"30th June 1827 The Amicable Society

It is with regret we have to iniorm our readers that the Amicable Society, established in 1787 at Burton-in-Kendal, for the relief of its members in sickness, infirmity and old age, has been obliged to dissolve itself, in consequence of the failure of the treasurer. This Society was always considered to be one of the most flourishing in the north of England, having accumulated a capital of upwards of £1,500, and consisted of 111 members. As a striking instance of its prosperity, the clear produce of the year ending at Lady Day last would have been (had it continued) upwards of £34, after paying sick etc., and fourteen aged members at 12/-d. a month. We understand that a new Society is established at that place, on a similar plan to the old one, under the authority and provisions of the 18 Geo. 3 CaP.128, whereby its fund will be properly secured; which has already received the most prompt support from the neighbouring gentry, and there can be little doubt of its obtaining a large accession of young and healthy members."

The Repair Shop

Are you saying I'm an animal?

Well, animals eat, sleep and communicate like us. We're classified as mammals and have hearts, lungs, muscles and DNA like theirs.

But we walk on two legs!

As do gibbons and kangaroos.

We have opposable thumbs.



Baking is still very popular and whenever you call at someone's house, family or friend you never get a cup of tea or coffee it always comes with biscuits, cakes, sandwiches... and often much more. Living there I embraced that culture, especially when so much has gone on there especially during the troubles. And if you don't bake, there is a bakery on nearly every corner (that's a slight exaggeration ... but as they say in Northern Ireland..." never let the truth get in the way of a good story.")

FLAKEMEAL BISCUITS 200 grams soft butter 150 grams castor sugar 150 grams plain flour 75 grams desiccated coconut 325 grams oats

The Royal Oak Update

We are finally getting closer to opening our doors at the Royal Oak. As many of you are aware the pub has been closed for over 17 years.

There has been major construction work required to enable the pub to reopen as a community hub for everyone to enjoy.


